

Relative/Absolute Contraindications

- History of allergy to any component of the product
- History of Anaphylactic Reaction
- History of Neuromuscular Disorders
- Active herpetic lesions
- Active skin rashes
- Keloids
- Egg/Cows milk allergy
- Patients taking medications that can interfere with neuromuscular transmission*
- Recent antibiotic treatment
- Recent NSAID/ACA/Heavy EtOH use within 1 week of injections

 $\textbf{Figure 2} \ \ \textbf{Ptosis after botulinum toxin injection in the right eye}.$




Cost


- \$1.66 per unit to \$6 per unit depending on the company that you purchase from

- Volumetric/Net 30 pricing is available



Important things to remember

- Storage
- Appropriate size of needles to use
- Effects are irreversible so use with caution











Relative/Absolute Contraindications

- Allery to components of the product
- History of Anaphylactic Reaction/Multiple Severe Medication allergies
- Keloiding
- Active infection/rash at the site of treatment
- Important social function within 1 week of injection
- Pregnancy/Breastfeeding

Cost

- \$200-500 per 1 ml vial
- Retail pricing is about double to 66% more than cost of goods
- Kits come with needles and syringes
- Volumetric/Net 30 pricing available

Important things to remember

- Complications (immediate versus delayed onset)
- Dental blocks
- Swelling
- Hyaluronidase


Potential Complications

Nodule formation














Relative/Absolute Contraindications

- Recent anemia
- Patients on blood thinners (any type)
- Active infections/inflammation in the area to be treated
- Diseases with platelet deficiencies
- History of skin cancer (facial/vulvar uses)

Cost

- High return on investment
- Things to factor in: Tube costs, microneedling costs, additive costs, needles, syringes
- PRP with microneedling retail price ranges*: \$400-\$1200
- Vaginal rejuvenation retail price ranges*: \$800-\$1500
- PRP hair injection retail price ranges*: \$300-\$800

Important things to Remember

- Copyright infringement
- Varying amount of time that the effects last

Chemical Peels

- Surface peels (0.06-0.08 mm)
- Moderately deep peels (0.4-0.6 mm)
- Deep peels (0.6-0.8 mm)

What do chemical peels help with?

- Sun damaged skin
- Hyperpigmentation
- Acne scars
- Wrinkles
- Fine lines
- Atrophic skin

Surface Peels

- Tretinoin
- Fruit Acid (up to 40%)
- Amino Acid
- Salicylic Acid (up to 10%)
- Biological Peels
- TCA (Trichloroacetic acid)
- Jessner Peels

Moderate Peels

- Fruit Acid (up to 70%)
- Salicylic Acid (up to 30%)
- TCA (35-50%)
- Jessner with TCA (35%)
- Blue Peel
- Easy Peel
- Skin Resurfacing (laser)

Deep Peels

- TCA (50-70%)
- Baker Phenol Peeling
- Exoderm Peeling
- Dermabrasion

Relative/Absolute Contraindications

- Bacterial/purulent infections
- Actinic Keratosis
- History of skin cancer
- Thin skin with teleangectatsia
- Recent skin alterations- laser, filler, other peels, medications that affect the skin
- Pregnancy/Breast feeding

Potential Complications

- Photosensitivity
- Skin Irritation
- · Herpes Infections
- Itchiness
- Burning
- Hyperpigmentation
- · Scabbing/scarring
- Liver/Kidney Damage*
- Cardiac arrhythmia
- Infections

Texas Law Review

Physician Responsibilities

- Take a history.
- Perform an appropriate physical examination make an appropriate diagnosis.
- Recommend appropriate treatment; develop a detailed and written treatment plan.
- Obtain the patient's informed consent.
- Provide instructions for emergency and follow-up care.
- Prepare and maintain an appropriate medical record.
- Have signed and dated written protocols and signed/dated written standing orders.
- Quality Assurance Programs for continuing education.

Who can you delegate to?

- Nurse Practitioners
- Physician Assistants
- Registered Nurses
- Medical Assistants
- Estheticians
- Your Uncle Jimmy

What the law says about delegating to unlicensed qualified individuals

- Physician, Physicians Assistant or Nurse Practitioner (under the delegation of a Physician) must be on site during the procedure
- The delegating Physician should be readily available if there is an adverse outcome
- Procedures performed by unlicensed individuals have to be cosigned by a Physician
- The physician must ensure that a person performing a Procedure has appropriate
 training in techniques, knowledge of cosmetic or cutaneous medicine, indications
 and contraindications, pre and post-procedural care, recognition and acute
 management of potential complications and infectious disease control involved with
 each treatment.

What the law says continued...

- Each patient signs a consent form prior to treatment that lists potential side effects and complications, and the identity and titles of the individual who will perform the Procedure.
- Each person performing a Procedure must be readily identified by a name tag or similar means that clearly delineates the identity and credentials of the person.
- Any time a Procedure is performed, at least one person trained in basic life support must be onsite.
